The objective will be to present the class with historical and authorial context for the text studied, a general understanding of its place within American literary history, and questions designed to guide class discussion. Presentations will be approximately 10 minutes in length (not including discussion), and must include:

- A brief hand-out for the class
- Clear connection to other course readings
- Leading questions for the class (to spark discussion)
- 500-750-word response paper arguing for your interpretation of the text
